Rectifying error in Limmud-Oz report

I GENUINELY enjoyed all the wonderful people I met in Australia during my month-long scholar-inresidence during May and June 2011. The country - and the Jewish community - has every reason to be proud. I hope to return.

Unfortunately, The Australian Jewish News article, published just after I left the country, incorrectly asserted that I called Naomi Chazan, president of New Israel Fund (NIF), "a liar" during my panel presentation at Limmud-Oz (AIN 17/06). I did not do so.

Rather, I asked questions trying to reconcile the conflicting public information on three major organisational websites: that of NIE that of NGO Monitor, and that of Coalition of

Women for Peace on the question of whether NIF directly or indirectly funded Coalition of Women for Peace for a continuing period of time that extended into the spring of 2011. I was one of four speakers. After the panel, moderator Judge Rothman commented: "I think we can thank each of the speakers for being as disciplined. I for one have been most informed."

The online version of this incorrect article was distributed worldwide through the internet. I immediately made it clear to the editors that the assertion was false. I believe the error appeared as a result of a misunderstanding that occurred between the story first being written and the publication of the final version. The Australian Jewish News removed the article from its online archive within four minutes of my request. The San Diego Jewish World, which reprinted the piece, also pulled the article within four minutes of my request.

The Australian Jewish News editors and I agreed that the best way to negate this misleading story and avoid using precious news space, was this letter to the editor.

As part of my request, The Australian Jewish News has donated \$18 to their chosen charity, Magen David Adom, an excellent choice.

During discussions with The Australian Jewish News, I found the editors extremely professional, collegial, and gracious. The matter is now closed and I thank the editors for correcting this matter.

Offensive use of Shoah hero's poem

AN article published in *The Australian* (02/07) by Will Pavia on bankers being excluded from private clubs in New York is meant to be humorous and it is indeed in some ways well-written and entertaining.

Pavia, however, displays insensitivity and lack of historical sense when, in his first paragraph, he uses an extended allusion to a famous statement by Pastor Martin Niemollor, an anti-Nazi who was imprisoned by the Nazis in Sachsenhausen and Dachau concentration camps. Pavia writes "First they came for the suited and booted, and they did not speak out, because they felt that they could always wear something else at their private club. Then they came for the bankers, the wealthy masters of the universe astonished them.'

Neimollor's words - often presented as a poem entitled First they came for the Jews is usually presented as follows:

First they came for the communists, and I didn't speak out because I wasn't a communist. Then they came for the trade unionists.

and I didn't speak out because I wasn't a trade unionist. Then they came for the Jews, and I didn't speak out because I

Then they came for me and there was no one left to speak out for me.

wasn't a Jew.

Niemollor's statement and the critically important message at its heart should not be used - however innocently - for a cheap laugh.

It is one thing to make fun of bankers, who are well able to defend themselves. It is another thing to use the victims of the Nazis, including some six million Iewish men, women and children murdered simply for

Making sure your mezuzahs are kosher

CONGRATULATIONS to the Rabbinical Council of Victoria for taking a stance on the issue of nonkosher and poor-quality mezuzahs being sold in Judaica shops (AJN 08/07). There is often no guarantee that these mezuzahs have either been written or checked by properly qualified scribes, and I personally have been offered and have seen nonkosher mezuzahs.

Well-meaning but non-knowledgable people who have bought these in good faith often find out after checking many years later that they have been duped resulting in a chillul Hashem. This causes severe angst and frustration to all involved, including the scribe doing the checking and people rightly question a system that allows this to occur.

It is therefore encouraging to see our local rabbinate finally taking a stand on this very important issue. I suggest that while their announcement is timely and welcome, they should take the next step and offer the "average Jew" a level of confidence by certifying reputable resellers who guarantee to sell only kosher mezuzahs.

Note that a computer check is not kosher certification, nor is an unsigned certificate.

War threat by Syria

"ANY more raids by Israel on Syrian territory will 'definitely' mean war," Syria said yesterday in a Foreign Ministry statement broadcast on Radio Damascus. The statement said that if the United Nations failed to condemn Israel for aggression against Syria, it might be Syria's last complaint to the UN. In New York on Friday, Israel accused Syria of "repeated acts of aggression" in violation of the Syrian-Israeli armistice and the UN Charter. Defending its July 14 retaliatory air raid against Syria, Israel told the Security

Council that she would defend her territory and citizens whenever necessary, but suggested the UN leave settlement of the incident to its on-the-spot authorities

NSW Teach-in

THE first NSW State Zionist Council "Teach In" was held in Sydney recently. The function was described as "most successful" by Zionist leaders. But there was controversy. Journalist Sam Lipski told the Teach In, the Zionist movement in Australia has failed in lewish education, youth work and giving local Jews a "link with Israel", while

speaker Ted Whitgrob described "political Zionism" as a "spent force". In a lengthy statement Mr Duffield, general secretary of the Australian Zionist Federation, said these speakers were not aware of the efforts the Zionist movement had made to widen its ranks and to persuade young people to take an active part in Zionist activities other than fundraising.

He beat Eichmann

A MAN who outsmarted Adolph Fichmann is visiting Melbourne. He is Mr A Gruenhut, 71. of Israel, who saved several thousand

Jews by smuggling them to Hungary (still safe from Nazi tyranny) after Eichmann and his henchmen had decided to liquidate 100,000 Jews of Slovakia in February 1942. Among those he rescued were 200 Pressburg Jews, by organising an illegal ship to take them to Haifa.
